Admission to Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College's Associate Degree MA program is on a first qualified, first admitted basis. Twenty-four seats are available. Applicants are encouraged to apply early. You must meet the requirements outlined in this overview and be a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident to qualify. Admission of international students must comply with federal and state regulations pertaining to international student enrollment in U.S. colleges.

Interested individuals must attend a Health Information Program (HIP) Session (either on campus or online) to receive an application packet. All documents submitted with the application packet become the exclusive property of the college and will not be returned to the applicant. Qualified applicants who attended college outside of the United States and meet citizenship requirements must provide official transcripts from World Education Service. Fees for English translation of international transcripts must be paid by the applicant (contact our Registrar at studentrecords@octech.edu or 803-535-1222 for details). Misrepresentation of information on any required forms or a willful attempt to misrepresent residency will make an applicant ineligible for admission to OCtech Nursing and Health Science programs.

Applicants who have attempted (withdrawal and/or failure) a Nursing or Health Science course two or more times OR applicants who have had two or more Nursing or Health Science program attempts (withdrawal and/or failure) within the last 5 years may only apply through the appeals process. All applicants can expect to hear from the College according to the schedule listed above. There is no guarantee that you will be accepted; however, we suggest that you make financial arrangements and complete the FAFSA (www.fafsa.ed.gov) in the event that you are offered admission, since payment of tuition, fees and books will be due upon enrollment.

A national background check and/or drug test will be required upon acceptance to the program and before starting class. Positive results on background check and/or drug test may prohibit participation in clinical experiences and may necessitate removal from the program. Clinical sites may require additional background and drug testing during the course of a student's enrollment.

It is the responsibility of the student to notify the Program Coordinator or Dean in a Nursing/Health Science program of any criminal charges, convictions, orders and/or sanctions that occur during the course of his/her enrollment. Failure to notify the Program Coordinator or Dean may necessitate removal from the program and revocation of eligibility to take the State Board Examination for Licensure or the National Certification Exam.

Note: Prior criminal convictions may affect eligibility to take the State Board Examination for Licensure.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Part I - Applicants must meet the following requirements to be eligible to move to Part II:

- ✓ Attend a Health Information Program (HIP) Session (in person or online).
- ✓ Be a high school graduate or possess a GED. (Official transcript must be submitted. If this information is already on file, it does not need to be resubmitted.)
- ✓ Official transcripts from all colleges must be submitted. (If this information is already on file, it does not need to be resubmitted.)

Part II - Applicants qualifying to submit an application must meet the following criteria:

To qualify for admission into the MA program, the applicant must meet college level entrance requirements and the 12 credit hours required in the Phase 1 program courses with a cumulative Grade Point Average of 2.0 or higher. Biology 117 or higher and/or Phlebotomy 141 and 144 may be substituted into the 12 hours required for Phase I as listed below.

Once qualification criteria is met, admission will be on first qualified, first admitted basis. Please note it is highly recommended that you take AHS 141 and AHS 145 in the spring 2021 and AHS 144 and AHS 166 in the summer prior to entering the MA program.

ALL MA students must be able to meet the core performance standards for the classroom and clinical environment before starting the program.

Professional Relationships	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Establishment of rapport with patients/clients and colleagues 2) Capacity to engage in successful conflict resolution 3) Peer accountability

Tactile Sense	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Ability to palpate in physical examinations and various therapeutic interventions Ex: Distinguish smells which are contributory to assessing and/or maintaining patient's health status, e.g. smell fire, wound drainage

Temperament/Awareness	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Perform procedures on patients in pain from trauma, disease or under the influence of drugs/alcohol 2) Maintain professional composure under stress 3) Be aware of the potential exposure to pathogens through bodily secretions, mucous and blood

MEDICAL ASSISTING

A student may enroll in a CAAHEP accredited Medical Assisting program, but upon graduation may not be eligible to take the certification exam and become a Certified Medical Assistant without a waiver as established by the Certifying Board. Note: Individuals who have been found guilty of a felony or pleaded guilty to a felony are not eligible to take the CMA Exam; however, the Certifying Board may grant a waiver based upon mitigating circumstances. Students who may be affected by this should contact the American Association of Medical Assistants at 20 North Wacker Drive, Suite 1575, Chicago, IL 60606-2903 to clarify eligibility status to sit for the AAMA Exam.

An admissions physical examination validating health status is required. Proof of CPR (infant, child, adult and AED-BLS for healthcare providers) is required before the MA goes to clinicals. As part of the admissions process, students will be required to have a Criminal Background Check and Drug Screen through facilities specified by the College.

The Commission on Allied Health Education Programs certified the Diploma Medical Assisting Program and judged it to be in compliance with the nationally established standards on September 20, 2013. This Continuing Accreditation is in effect until the next scheduled onsite review to occur Fall of 2020.
